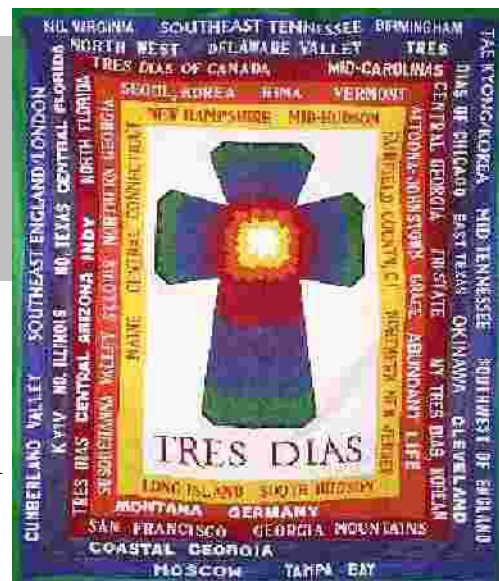

## “CREATED TO PRAISE!”

### Chosen as Theme for Annual Assembly



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Tres Dias was “created to praise,” and the pescadores who travel to the Houston suburb of Spring, TX, July 9-11 for the 31<sup>st</sup> Annual Assembly will be praising God— for the way Tres Dias has changed lives in their local communities, and also for the way the Lord is guiding the growth and expansion of Tres Dias worldwide.

The praise will start with singing at the Friday evening pot luck and secuela, and continue the next morning with an event many consider one of the most memorable acts of praise, the annual “carrying of the banners.”

Early in the history of Tres Dias, each community was asked to create and contribute a banner reflecting something distinctive about that community’s history or geographic location. The banners—more than eighty—are transported from one location to another for each Assembly.

At the start of the Saturday morning plenary session, a delegate from each community present enters the hall carrying his or her community’s banner. For those locations with no delegate in attendance, someone from another community will fill in as banner carrier—symbolic of the support that exists among communities. The banner-carriers circle the perimeter of the hall and place their banners in stanchions, where they will remain while the Assembly is in session. Symboli-

cally, each local community is part of the larger community. The unity banner, showing the names of all communities (see above), stands at the front of the hall to reinforce this meaning. It’s a parade of many colors, praise written in English, Korean, Russian, and other languages, lifted on high. The psalmist in Psalm 150 had his trumpet, harp, tambourine, and flute. The Tres Dias Assembly has its banners.

The Saturday meetings continue with the announcement of election results for new officers, with praise and thanksgiving for the leadership these men and women will provide in the year ahead.

The remainder of the day includes both business meetings and break-out sessions. These workshops, led by members of the host community, are opportunities for delegates to learn and share insights on such topics as “Sponsoring Candidates,” “Sharing Tres Dias with Your Pastor,” and “Starting a New Tres Dias Community.”

One break-out session will be an open forum hosted by Tres Dias President Paul Weis. Titled “The President’s Forum,” this is an opportunity to ask about and comment on any issue facing Tres Dias. The Essentials training and “train the trainer” sessions will be held Saturday evening. Service, too, is an act of praise. When the standing committees meet on Sunday morning, any delegate is welcome to join a committee as a voting member.

## The President's Letter

# LOOKING FORWARD TO THE ASSEMBLY

## And a Chance to Answer Your Questions



Let me tell you my personal story—how it happened that a guy named Paul Weis finds himself writing a letter as President of an international Christian ecumenical organization known as Tres Dias.

After my weekend, I felt a real calling to begin serving Tres Dias in every way possible – on teams, on the local Secretariat, on teams for the other community nearby, etc. Through the Tres Dias Website, I was able to gain a better understanding of the full scope of Tres Dias, not just in Illinois, but around the world. By the summer of 2003, I had discovered that all pescadores were welcome to attend the Tres Dias Annual Assembly, wiping out my assumption that the meeting was open to the select few. The Annual Assembly for 2003 was to be held in Cleveland, a drivable distance for me. I talked to some people in my local community, and for the first time ever, Illinois actually had representatives at an Annual Assembly.

When I arrived, I discovered that I had become a member of a much larger community than I realized. Being united in the body of Christ, having shared the common experience of Tres Dias, I felt right at home with my new brothers and sisters.

Then I discovered something else. All of those attending (not just members of the International Secretariat and delegates) were invited to sit in on the committee meetings. Before long, I found myself being welcomed as a voting member of a committee—and making plans to attend future Secretariat meetings. Eventually I found myself on the Membership Committee, subsequently becoming Membership VP and ultimately President.

So, who am I? Just another Tres Dias pescador like you, who happened to hear a calling to serve this ministry.

Is the Lord calling you? Maybe you just need to invest a little time to find out. You are under no special obligation when you attend an Annual Assembly, but if you are coming, let your Secretariat know. It's not too late to arrange to attend the meeting as a delegate of your community. And if you can't come as a delegate, come as an observer. At the very least,

you will be blessed by the fellowship.

Of the various workshops and breakout sessions, I especially look forward to the President's Forum, which I will be conducting for the second time. A large portion of the forum consists of a question-and-answer session. This builds on a theme I have been emphasizing during my term as President—more frequent, more meaningful communication between those of us on the International Secretariat and persons like you, who serve Tres Dias in the local communities.

There's no reason why the President's Forum can't continue long after the Assembly. The editors and I have often talked about introducing a question

## A Message from the Membership Vice President

### NURTURING NEW FOREIGN COMMUNITIES



There's no doubt that Tres Dias is an international organization. In the past decade, we've seen new communities take root and flourish in Jamaica, Peru, Canada, Ecuador, Costa Rica, Russia, Ukraine, and Korea. Currently, we are looking at the possibility of communities in Denmark, Mexico, the Philippines, and South Africa.

It seems to be happening all over. Why? It's because the people who lead the way in establishing these communities have mobility, because they have a love for a particular place, and most important, because they have an incredible message in their heart about the love of God, and need to find a way of delivering that message.

There is, however, a proper way to lay a foundation for a Tres Dias community, which is very different from simply "having a weekend." We've learned a lot in the past ten years about how to lay that foundation, and about nurturing a community into maturity and independence.

Our experience has reinforced the critical role the sponsoring community plays at each stage. The first stage involves helping to develop reunion groups in the new location. For example, right now, in Denmark we have a set of weekends scheduled for October. Germany is the sponsor. The people in Denmark went through their weekends in Germany and now meet regularly as reunion groups, and have also formed a steering committee to look at the future.

We've learned that a community has a far greater chance of success if it starts with a minimum of about 20 pescadores (10 men and 10 women). Ideally, these numbers should be doubled, but this is precisely where things get complicated. Visa requirements and transportation costs can limit the number of candidates the sponsoring community can bring in from abroad to experience a Tres Dias weekend.

As with new US communities, inviting candidates from a variety of denominations, with an eye for individuals with leadership ability, helps build a foundation. With foreign start-ups, it's especially critical to involve local pastors from the beginning.

Often, the teams for the first weekends will come from the sponsoring community, but sometimes a call will go out to other communities, "A new community is starting in Denmark, or South Africa, or wherever, and we need people to support them."

Usually, the first teams consist almost entirely of pescadores from established communities. Although people in the emerging community have gone through a weekend, they've not had the experience of serving on the team. Often, the sponsor will continue to invite pescadores from other communities to join teams for several years, gradually reducing the supportive commitment until the teams can be composed entirely of experienced pescadores in that emerging community.

In developing countries, the team fees may be higher than candidate fees. For example, for Peru, the cost for supportive and sponsoring team members is \$150, compared with \$50 for candidates. That extra \$100 goes to support the community by sponsoring

candidates and helping team members return to serve. A lot of times, the developing community doesn't have funds to buy palanca. In Peru, the camp ground is an hour away from the meeting place, and the community needs to rent a bus for transportation.

In many ways, the things people do to put on a weekend are the same regardless of location—but with the added complications, and added cost, at each stage, that come from working in a different culture, and often in a foreign language.

We learned that it is important for funding for a new community to go through the sponsoring community, and that the sponsor should provide complete accountability for funds received (sources, amounts) and dispersed. Remaining funds collected for the weekend, over and above expenses, should be left with the developing community.

The sponsoring team members will continue to work with the local pescadores to form a secretariat. A new community takes a minimum of two to three years before it can be self-governing. No individual or sponsoring community should "hold a weekend" without fully committing to help the new community become mature and independent.

To affirm this commitment, the International Secretariat asks both the sponsor and the new community to sign an Emerging Communities Agreement. Both parties affirm that they will follow the Essentials and that they will take the steps needed for chartering the new organization. This also helps protect Tres Dias' copyrights.

Fourth Day Talk

## A Story of Four Miracles

*The first time she attended a weekend, she asked to be taken home...and then, the facility caught on fire!  
Here's what happened after the second weekend.*

My name is Cheri Dreska. My husband, John, and I attend St. Patrick's Catholic Church with our children, Joshua, Christopher, Catherine, Nicholas, Sarah, Alexis, David, and Zachary. I attended Northern Illinois Tres Dias number 14 in the fall of 1999, where I sat at the table of Hannah.

When I was asked to give this talk, I had to laugh at the journey my life has taken since that October weekend ten years ago.

First of all, there was my weekend....

John had come home from his spring weekend so excited and raring to go that I couldn't help looking forward to going in the fall...until two days before the weekend when I changed my mind.

Well, I *did* get on that big yellow bus, but I have to say I was the candidate the team spends a lot of time praying about. On Friday night, I approached one of our pastors after the evening service, not to discuss my insight from the weekend, but to tell her I would be going home. Yep, going home.

She responded with, "Do you want me to wake up a team member to take you all the way home now? Or do you think you could wait until morning?" Well, yes, I *could* stand it that long, but I was completely out of place, not "getting" what everyone else seemed to be getting, and I was certainly not enjoying myself. So why the heck stay?

Then, a short while later, the smoke alarms went off. The Bishop Lane facility was on fire!

Oh, you want misguided guilt? I had plenty of it. Especially when I returned home in the middle of the night and my husband, John, looked at me saying, "What did you do?"

Wow! What a change ten years have made. It turns out I was one of those in whom the seeds are planted and just take time to grow...quite a while! In 2005, John and I ended a three-year term as Weekend Chairs, and we apparently decided we needed something to fill all that time we had been spending in the storage closet—so John and I, along with our four biological children, became a foster family. Over the past four and a half years, our family has been on a God-driven journey, where we have experienced unspoken joy, sorrow, frustration, anger, love, and unconditional support from others. We have relied on and continue to rely on our Tres Dias family for an abundance of prayer on this very challenging path.

On September 6, 2005, our lives forever

changed when a set of three little siblings were dropped off on our gravel driveway—and the case-worker actually drove away, leaving them with us!

After being told that only a miracle could alter the heartbreaking legal course of their case, this community began to pray for exactly that—a miracle! On December 22, four years, three months, and seventeen days from the day they were dropped off, we received that miracle—Jersey, Brooklyn, and Dakota became Sarah Marie Dreska, Alexis Grace Dreska, and David Michael Dreska.

Nineteen-month-old Zachary is the biological brother of the three and has been with us since the day he was one-day old. When he arrived, he was virtually deaf and blind—a very sick baby who was likely severely mentally impaired, would never be able to walk, and apparently going through withdrawal.

Those first few weeks were beyond anything we thought we could ever handle. I *can* say his little lungs were working just fine! One evening I brought the little guy with me to a secuela. One of my Tres Dias sisters asked to pray for him. Several people gathered around him in prayer. We again found ourselves praying for a miracle.

A couple of days later, one of our older children excitedly called to me from the baby's room. When I arrived, she was yelling, "He followed me with his eyes! He could see me!"

Over the next few days, his eyes began to follow any and everything in his world. A miracle of prayer? You decide. I know what I believe! I know what I believe.

As time progressed, it became obvious he was not mentally impaired. In fact, he was a smart little guy. On the day he turned nine months old, he took his first step. Because of the numerous ear infections, we had tubes inserted. What a shock when it became obvious that he could hear us! He is now speaking important words like "cookie," "doggie," and of course, "mommy!"

While we realize he will have challenges in the future and will probably need ankle braces to support his legs, this child is truly a product of God's grace and mercy—combined with the power of prayer from those who honestly believe prayer can change everything! That would be you, the community.

We call each other often, sharing our joys, our challenges, and our strides forward in our walk with the Lord. We hold each other accountable in our piety, study, and action. Without a reunion group, I easily become lazy in this walk, especially in study. Oh—I'll tell myself, I'll read that Bible chapter later, right after I read this magazine.

I strongly urge all of you, if you are not part of a reunion group, to find one that fits your schedule and personality. Maybe you are feeling drawn to begin one of your own. Go for it!

This is an amazing community and you are part of it! Realize what an incredible blessing it is! And never, never, doubt the power of prayer! Miracles do happen and I have four of them living with me to prove it!
